With the support and understanding of my HCC colleagues, I cut back on the number of committees and authorities that was a member of during 2023/24 due to my husband, Peter's illness. I stepped down from Southern Inshore Fisheries Conservation Authority (SIFCA) headquartered in Poole and Hants and IoW Fire and Rescue Authority. I continue to be a member of the Health and Adult Social Care (HASC) Select Committee and new Universal Services (incl Highways, Countryside Services, Waste Mgt, Regulatory and Trading Stds) Select Committee. I still represent HCC on the Deadwater Valley Trust, the Bramshott Education Trust, the River Wey Trust, and the South Downs National Park Authority. I thank all my colleagues for their support and understanding over the past few months. Hopefully "normal service" will soon be resumed.

The Council

HCC has 78 elected members, aka Councillors. Each Councillor represents one of the 76 divisions in Hampshire and is elected by the voters on the electoral roll for that division. There are 51 Conservative Councillors, 18 LibDem, 3 Labour and 4 Independent and currently 2 vacancies. The Leader is ClIr Rob Humby, and the Deputy Leader is ClIr Roz Chadd. Councillors act locally to represent, promote, and support the interests of their electoral division and its community and to represent the County Council.

The Chairman of HCC is the civic and ceremonial head of the Authority and represents the County Council at a variety of events and functions. The position of Chairman is held for a period of one year only. The current Chairman of HCC is Cllr Patricia Stallard, and the current Vice Chairman is Cllr Keith Mans.

HCC's four strategic aims are:

- Hampshire maintains strong and resilient economic growth and prosperity.
- People in Hampshire live safe, healthy, and independent lives.
- People in Hampshire enjoy a rich and diverse environment.
- People in Hampshire enjoy being part of strong, inclusive, resilient communities.

Hampshire County Council Organisation

HCC is the third largest shire council in the country, delivering the majority of Hampshire's public services, to almost 1.42 million residents (excluding people living in the Southampton and Portsmouth unitary council areas).

We are responsible for around 80% of all spend on council services in Hampshire, amounting to £2.6 billion a year.

What Hampshire County Council is responsible for:

Services provided by Hampshire County Council include:

- <u>Education and Learning</u> including supporting Hampshire schools. (excluding privately run Academy Schools)
- <u>Services for children and families</u> including adoption and fostering, safeguarding, and support for young people
- <u>Maintenance of Hampshire's roads</u> (except motorways and trunk roads which are the responsibility of National Highways), <u>licensing</u> for providers who need to work on the highway, and support for operators of <u>public transport</u>
- <u>Planning</u> applications for mineral extraction, waste management and public buildings
- Provision of social care and health in Hampshire
- The <u>Hampshire Library Service</u>
- The <u>Countryside Service</u>, looking after <u>rights of way</u>, and many of the county's <u>important</u> <u>green spaces</u>
- <u>Household Waste Recycling Centres</u> where residents can dispose of unwanted items. (District, borough or city councils manage kerbside household waste collections)
- <u>Trading Standards</u>, ensuring fair trading in Hampshire, by supporting the county's businesses and protecting Hampshire consumers.

Each year we:

- Support around 10,000 children in need of vital social care.
- Provide 360,000 meals-on-wheels lunches.
- Educate over 138,000 pupils in Hampshire's 463 maintained schools.
- Maintain 5,500 miles of roads and 1,750 bridges and structures.
- Provide long term care and support to over 18,400 adults, 66% of whom are older people.
- Manage 3,600 hectares of land for wildlife, heritage, and public access.
- Protect Hampshire consumers through the work of Trading Standards and prevent £1m of unregulated and unsafe goods entering the county.
- Manage over 600,000 tonnes of household waste and recyclable material diverting around 95% of this from landfill.
- Support 3,000 victims of domestic abuse
- Help 5,300 people to stop smoking tobacco and live healthier lives.

HCC 2024/25 Budget

Hampshire County Council's expenditure for 2024/25 includes a £2.9bn annual budget and covers all the services delivered by the council for 1.4 million residents, including supporting its most vulnerable children and adults.



Alongside revenue budget plans which relate to the day-to-day delivery of local services to Hampshire residents, the County Council has also approved new capital spending of £880.6 million over the next three years which will boost jobs and the local economy, the quality of the environment and contribute towards the County Council's commitment to tackling climate change. This provision for Hampshire's infrastructure is one of the largest in the country and brings the County Council's four-year total investment in the fabric of Hampshire, to £1.4 billion, providing a huge boost to the local economy through jobs, skills, and construction.

The three-year programme includes:

- £173 million to safeguard the long-term viability of the Older Adult care estate.
- £192 million investment in new and extended school buildings to provide school places for children in Hampshire delivering a further 5,312 school places and giving a total of 19,989 new school places by September 2027.
- £163 million for structural maintenance and improvement of roads and bridges.
- £73 million of Integrated Transport Plan schemes including £43 million of schemes focused around walking and/or cycling improvements.
- £76 million to address condition-based enhancements to schools.

From 1 April 2024, Hampshire County Council's portion of council tax will increase by a total of 4.99%, of which 2% will go specifically towards adults' social care and supporting the county's higher numbers of older people and adults with complex needs and disabilities - in line with Government policy. This equates to an annual charge of £1,533.24 for a Band D property – an increase of £72.99 per year or approximately £1.40 a week.

Liphook, Headley and Grayshott Division Highlights

My inbox is still dominated by Highways and Countryside Services issues – overgrown footpaths and rough BOATs (Byway Open to All Traffic) surfaces; potholes; road resurfacing; flooding, blocked drains, and ditches; requests for traffic calming measures; parking on and damage to footpaths and verges; fallen trees and most concerning the problem with peak time dangerous driving and illegal parking at our local schools.

After many years of lobbying, meetings and co-operation with our District and Parish Councillors, the project to provide a safer walk route for Bohunt students to get to/from Liphook Railway Station to the rear entrance of the school has commenced. Tree work and power cable digs on Portsmouth Road are underway in preparation for the new Toucan (2 can – get it?! (2)) crossing. Hopefully this will relieve the congestion at The Square at peak times.

Following my escalation to PCC Donna Jones, our Neighbourhood Police team have been patrolling the area around Liphook Infants and Junior Schools following reports of inconsiderate and dangerous driving and parking at peak times. Parents were advised of "near misses" involving children. Thankfully no one was hurt. HCC Parking Enforcement officers have also been in attendance offering advice and issuing tickets.

I am very pleased that HCC Highways Traffic Management team have been working with Grayshott Parish Council to approve an HCC designed traffic calming scheme for Headley Road to be funded as Community Funded Initiative (CFI) project.

A Headley resident contacted me, concerned that they could find no information as to when/if CityFibre, who were awarded the Project Gigabit contract for rural broadband in Hampshire by Building Digital UK (BDUK), would provide superfast broadband to their home. I worked with HCC and Rt Hon Damian Hinds MP's staff, to question BDUK on this matter at a meeting in March where BDUK advised they should be able to send this information within the month and create a userfriendly postcode checker for consumers to use which should be available in the next 12 months. Residents should register their interest with CityFibre on <u>Project Gigabit Hampshire | CityFibre</u>. If a large number of 'registers of interest' are received for a particular area than this will at least give the providers a sense of the demand.
